## Just Plane Fact

MODES:


Someone at the field asked me to explain the difference between Mode I and Mode II and were then surprised to learn that there are four transmitter twin stick control configurations (or Modes).


The most common mode is Mode II, where the alleron and elevator controls are on the right stick with the rudder and throttle controls on the left stick. Some of us 'older' fliers use Mode I, where the alleron and throttle controls are on the right stick with the rudder and elevator controls on the left. Mode III is the reverse of Mode II and Mode IV (II) is the reverse of Mode I.

Rumor has it that some left handed pilots have switched from Mode II to Mode III to improve their flying!! Mode III allows the allerons and elevator to be controlled on the left stick with rudder and throttle to be controlled on the right stick...

Any stick configuration switch will involve a physical change to control stick springs and throttle detents. You will probably need a more 'positive' detent in Mode I/III to prevent the throttle position from changing while controlling the allerons.






The meal will start at 2:00 p.m. with flying before and after.

# Alternatives to **High Nitro Fuels:**

How You Can Continue Enjoying the Best Performance from Your Gas-Powered Models

A guide for hobbyists during the nitro shortage, from

ou're probably aware that model engine fuels having a high percentage of nitro are currently in short supply. The cause: an explosion at one of the world's largest nitromethane suppliers.

The shortage shouldn't limit your modeling activities and enjoymentprovided you know what alternatives are available to keep your gas-powered planes, cars, helicopters, and boats operating at their best.

Below you'll find some helpful advice and important cautions compiled by Great Planes and the world's leading engine manufacturers: O.S., SuperTigre, and Irvine. Together, we're committed to keeping the gas-powered R/C hobby as exciting as ever.

#### O: How will the nitromethane shortage affect the variety of model engine fuels that I can buv?

A: It appears that supplies of 5% nitro and FAI (no-nitro) will remain good. It's likely that you'll find the quantities of fuel with 10% or greater nitro content much more limited.

That should not have a serious impact on your modeling activities, however.

The preference for high nitro content is uniquely American. Modelers throughout Europe have been using FAI, no-nitro fuel for many years. The average nitro content of the most popular model engine fuels in England is only 5%. Though idle and pickup are slightly better with 10% nitro fuel, the overall performance will not be greatly affected.

#### Q: What effects on engine operation will I see when I switch to FAI or 5% nitro fuel?

A: Acceleration from low to high RPM will not be as strong as you may be used to. You'll also find that you will need to increase the idle RPMs slightly. particularly with your 4-cycle engines.

Expect a small decrease in top RPM and total horsepower output. The difference will be more noticeable with 2-cycle than 4-cycle engines.

#### Q: Can I run my engine lean to compensate for the RPM drop?

A: Do not over-lean your engine to increase the RPM.

You can "lean out" your engine-cut back on the fuel flow to increase the air/fuel mixture-in the usual manner to bring up the RPM. But if you're tempted to give the engine that "one little tweak more" as you go for the highest RPM. you may reduce the lubrication too much. This means a greater risk of overheating your engine and causing serious damage.

The percentage of lubricant is an important factor in the fuel you buy. Most experts recommend using fuel with an 18% to 22% amount of lubricant.

Castor oil has proven to be the best lubricant, but synthetics in adequate quantities work well also. Some fuel manufacturers claim to have discovered a high-tech solution to fuel lubrication which allows them to use a smaller percentage of lubricant. But our experience has been that such claims lead only to an increase in engine problems.

You should note that across the board. model engine warranties do not cover damage from overheating caused by overlean operation and/or use of a fuel with too little oil.

Stick with what works. When you use low-nitro or FAI fuel, run your engine in the normal manner, and expect a lower top-end RPM and higher idle RPM. Don't over-lean.

#### Q. What can I do to get the best performance with low-nitro fuel?

A. Some engines are already designed to deliver effective performance using lownitro model fuel. O.S., SuperTigre, and Irvine, all distributed throughout the U.S. by Great Planes, are manufactured in Japan and Europe (where nitromethane is not domestically produced). They're intended for hobbyists worldwide-many of whom use only FAI fuel.

If you're in the market for a new engine for your kit, we also suggest you choose a size toward the top end of the recommended range if you will be using low or no-nitro fuels.

Racers who have traditionally used fuels with very high nitro content-up to 30% or more -- may need to switch to special heads or remove the head shims to help compensate for reduced performance.

Consult the operating instructions that were included with your engine for further advice.


Even while the supply of high-nitro fuel may be limited, there's no reason for you to limit your enjoyment of the hobby. Use FAI and low-nitro fuels, and keep the action alive!
